NORTHERN MARKET REPORT -


Australian Dollar 79.63c US, as of 10/03/2005

Sales were held in Melbourne, Sydney and Fremantle this week. The national offering of approximately 58,500 bales this week was smaller compared to offerings over the past few weeks.

Sales were held on Wednesday and Thursday in Sydney. The market opened significantly cheaper on Wednesday with prices falling across all microns. 19.5 microns and finer saw prices fall around 5c/kg clean and it was the 20-23 microns which were the most affected with prices around 10-20c/kg clean cheaper. Prices for the broader end and crossbreds were around 5c/kg clean cheaper. The better style, low vm skirtings were unchanged while burry skirtings were slightly cheaper. Oddments were unchanged on last weeks quotes. With underlying demand for wool remaining stagnant, daily movements in the dollar continues to strongly affect wool prices. The dollar got as high as 79.8c US on Wednesday and was mostly responsible for prices falling in auctions on that day. However, despite all the talk about the dollar, demand remains the single most important driver of wool prices. The dollar would only have minimal impact on wool prices if the overseas demand for wool was stronger. Unfortunately for the industry right now the demand for wool isn't particularly strong. On Thursday prices stabilised with only small movements in prices for most microns. 20 micron and finer were unchanged while 21 micron and broader were 2-4c/kg clean dearer. Crossbreds were also dearer, prices finishing around 5c/kg clean higher. Merino skirtings were 5c/kg clean firmer while oddments were unchanged. Interestingly the passed-in rate for Wednesday was 8.5% while on Thursday it was 12.5%.

The continued easing of prices over the last few months has seen prices for 19 microns are at levels not seen since December 2003. And despite prices for 20,21 & 22 microns respectively trading at levels not seen since December 2001, they are still trading at or just above their 10 year average. This is illustrated in the table above and the graph below.

Sales continue next week in Melbourne, Sydney and Fremantle. The national offering next week is back to approximately 64,000 bales. Comments: Phil Roberts (Wooltrade)


