NO SALES IN SYDNEY THIS WEEK - SOUTHERN MARKET REPORT ATTACHTED

Sales this week were held in Melbourne only while both Sydney and Fremantle began a three week sale recess. The offering was only small in Melbourne with approximately 19,000 bales up for sale.

After the solid gains seen over the past few weeks, prices fell across all microns this week. The dollar was stronger, after trading below 74c US last week it rebounded above 75.5s US on Wednesday. Buyers commented that despite the lower dollar last week the prices for orders in US dollars remained constant. With the smaller demand and higher dollar prices couldn't hold last week's gains. Sales opened in Melbourne on Tuesday and prices were 10-15c/kg clean lower for 19 to 23 microns. With the small offering buyers became more selective as the better style, higher nkt lots were least affected by the falls. Crossbreds ended up around 5-10c/kg clean cheaper. Merino skirtings were generally unchanged while oddments went against the trend and finished the day around 5-10c/kg clean dearer. The passed-in rate for Tuesday was 10%.

There were further falls on Wednesday with 19-20 microns falling around 3c/kg clean while the broader and finer end fell a further 10c/kg clean. Crossbreds were only slightly easier while merino skirtings and oddments finished unchanged. The passed-in rate for Wednesday was 12%. Major buyers for the week were Williams Wool (1,984 bales), Itochu (1,928 bales) and Dewavrin (1,648 bales).

Very good sales continued on Wooltrade over the past two weeks and Wooltrade sold its 100,000th bale on Monday. While all three centres are now in sale recess, Wooltrade continues to offer growers an anvenue to the market. Growers looking to sell should consider listing on Wooltrade to gain market exposure while there are no auctions over the next few weeks.

Reports in the latest Ausfine Newsletter indicated that some mills in Europe now inspect all bales before scouring. In one mill around 40 Australian clip brands have been black banned and not to be purchased again. Examples of offending practices include the stacking of sub quality wool into bales and selling mixed lots with large differences in results on their average, e.g. 3 bales of wool with 0.3VM and 1 bale of 1.6VM to get an average of 1%VM. This is a timely reminder as went enter the new season to prepare clips properly in order to avoid these practices to maintain the integrity of the Australian industry.

All centres are now in sale recess. Sydney and Femantle resume sales in the first week of August while Melbourne resumes in the second week of August.
