NORTHERN MARKET REPORT (09/09/04)

Auction sales this week were held in Melbourne, Fremantle and there was a specialty fine wool sale in Newcastle. The national offering was slightly smaller than last week, with approximately 59,000 bales. There was strong demand for Spinners types in Newcastle on Tuesday and Wednesday, which saw some 16-17 micron lots up to 100c/kg clean dearer. Better style 45nkt lots 17-19 microns also attracted solid demand which saw prices rise 30-50c/kg clean. The broader end was slightly cheaper on Tuesday and Wednesday. There was a particularly low passed-in rate of 4% recorde for Wednesday.


There were few spinners types on Thursday in 16-18 microns and prices lost much of the gains from earlier in the week. 19 micron and broader were around 5c/kg clean lower on Thursday. Crossbreds were slightly cheaper over the week, losing around 5c/kg clean. While merino skirtings and oddments were generally unchanged for the week.

For the finer end the better style, 40nkt+ lots continue to be less affected by any dips in prices. It is interesting to note that 21-26 microns are currently trading at the lowest levels for this season.

The dollar pushed back over 70c US this week, and despite the US deciding to raise interest rates for the thrid time this year, it reached a weekly high of 70.83 on Thursday. A lack of business and sluggish buyer demand, combined with a relatively high supply of wool still held in brokers' stores around the country indicates a continuation of this downward pressure on prices in the short-term at least.

Sales continue in Sydney, Melbourne and Fremantle next week.
